### **Announcing Three New Initiatives to Support Student Success**

"There's an excitement here at The Albert Baker Fund (ABF). We are heading down new paths and celebrating many successes," says Joe Ritter, ABF's Chief Executive Officer. "This year we are implementing three initiatives to support career development: one-on-one mentoring with an experienced mentor, peer-to-peer student learning communities, and ABF professional LinkedIn groups. Each of these initiatives will provide a network for current students and recent college graduates to help them realize success in their careers and life."

#### FIRST INITIATIVE Mentors with a Christian Science Perspective

Currently, 44 students are participating in the mentoring program and have been matched with an experienced mentor. The program will be available to nearly 200 students living in the US and Canada beginning this fall. "Our mentoring program is designed to help students explore, develop, and expand their educational, professional, and spiritual growth," says Libby Scheiern, ABF's Scholarship and Student Success Manager.

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"We meet with interested students and match them with an experienced mentor who can provide a Christian Science perspective. This allows our students to understand and learn how a Christian Scientist practices in their profession."

Two students, **Odie Fields** and **Georgia Rather**, are participating in the program and have found the experience invaluable.

My Mentor and I Have Had Long Conversations About Using Christian Science as an Uplifting Tool

Odie Fields is a freshman at Maine Maritime Academy and is training to become a captain in the maritime industry. As a freshman, he has called upon his mentor for guidance on navigating his college experience.

"It means a lot to me to have a mentor with whom I can discuss real-life problems through the lens of Christian Science," Odie says.

"Since I am a freshman, discussions with my ABF mentor are not career based. I have found it very comforting to have a friend and professional to discuss choices and college dynamics. My mentor and I have had long conversations about using Christian Science as an uplifting tool rather than feeling secluded because of how we see the world. He has helped me walk through the paces of how to use something super precious in a world, like my world, which seems to feel it's undervalued."

The Pass Your Blessings Forward Scholarship is a \$1,500 scholarship funded by donors who want to pass forward their blessings to a young Christian Scientist attending college. The student also receives a \$3,500 Albert Baker Scholarship for a total award of \$5,000.
